### 1. FISH FOR BLACK GOLD

Each September, Sweden’s rugged west coast transforms into a huge seafood party with tiny boatsheds and smart gourmet restaurants celebrating lobster season. Why not indulge in a customised lobster safari?; hoist up the lobster pots, tie the lobster’s claws then cook your catch.

### 2. FAIRYTALE FYN

Not far from Copenhagen, but a world away from its sleek, high style lies the island of Fyn and crossing its suspension bridge is like stepping into a pop-up fairy tale. Birthplace of Hans Christian Andersen, Fyn is a treasure trove of pastel-washed, cobbled villages and rambling castles.

Rågskär, a small, private island near Stockholm, offers parties of 50 an exclusive experience in the natural archipelago beauty. Unforgettable is the only word to describe a meal of freshly skinned perch on a cliff-side table.

### 6. CHRISTIANA AND CARLSBERG

Host city of the UN Conference on Climate Change, Copenhagen combines a cool, cosmopolitan pulse with a splendid heritage. Christiania is like stepping back to the sixties age of flower power while the castles immortalise Shakespearean times.

### 7. LIVE LIKE A ROYAL

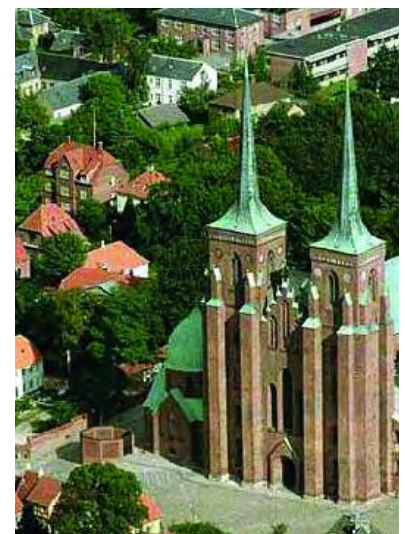
### 8. SKAGEN – THE LAND OF LIGHT
